

James Calvin Sly 1807 & Four Marriages

Research Process: Build a timeline from the 1st marriage until the death of each of my direct line ancestors. Three factors are part of each timeline: **1) Names:** of those in the family of each ancestral couple. **2) Places:** where each family lived are included on a snapshot of a Google “My Maps”. The maps will show migrational patterns. **3) Time of Events:** Dates are included in the left column for each event pertaining to the ancestral couple. Please scroll to the bottom to find the **Sources & Historical Markers** to which the footnote numbers refer. Color codes are used for historical markers.

Each Timeline is built with the information in Family Search/Family Tree that was available at the time. The **Names, Places & Events** data maybe subject to change as more research is added to the details & memories sections in Family Tree. It is my objective to add a personalized **PDF timeline** to each of my direct line ancestral couples. You will not be able to change the timeline because it is in a PDF format, but comparing a piece of data with events inside of a timeline often allows a person to see if it is viable data or not. Many of you are very good researchers & it is my hope that these timelines will be a springboard for fixing problems in Family Tree. If I find significant changes in Family Tree in events for an ancestral couple I will update the timeline and attach a new PDF, however, it is not my intent to do this very often. I used a spreadsheet called Numbers from the iWork Program on an iMac Computer, however Excel or other spreadsheets could be used to accomplish the same or maybe even better results.

This Timeline would be best utilized by having the person’s Details Page from Family Search/Family Tree open in a window next to the timeline. A timeline, for a family with multiple or polygamous marriages, emphasizes the wife who is my direct line ancestor.

Marriage: James Calvin Sly 21 to 1st wife Mary Bassett 20 in Manchester, Ontario, New York, United States. ^{3, Map A1}

4 March 1829

Andrew Jackson became the 7th President of the United States. ¹

15 May 1829

John the Baptist conferred the Aaronic Priesthood on Joseph Smith and Oliver Cowdery in Harmony, Pennsylvania. (see D&C 13; Joseph Smith—History 1:71–72).

May 1829

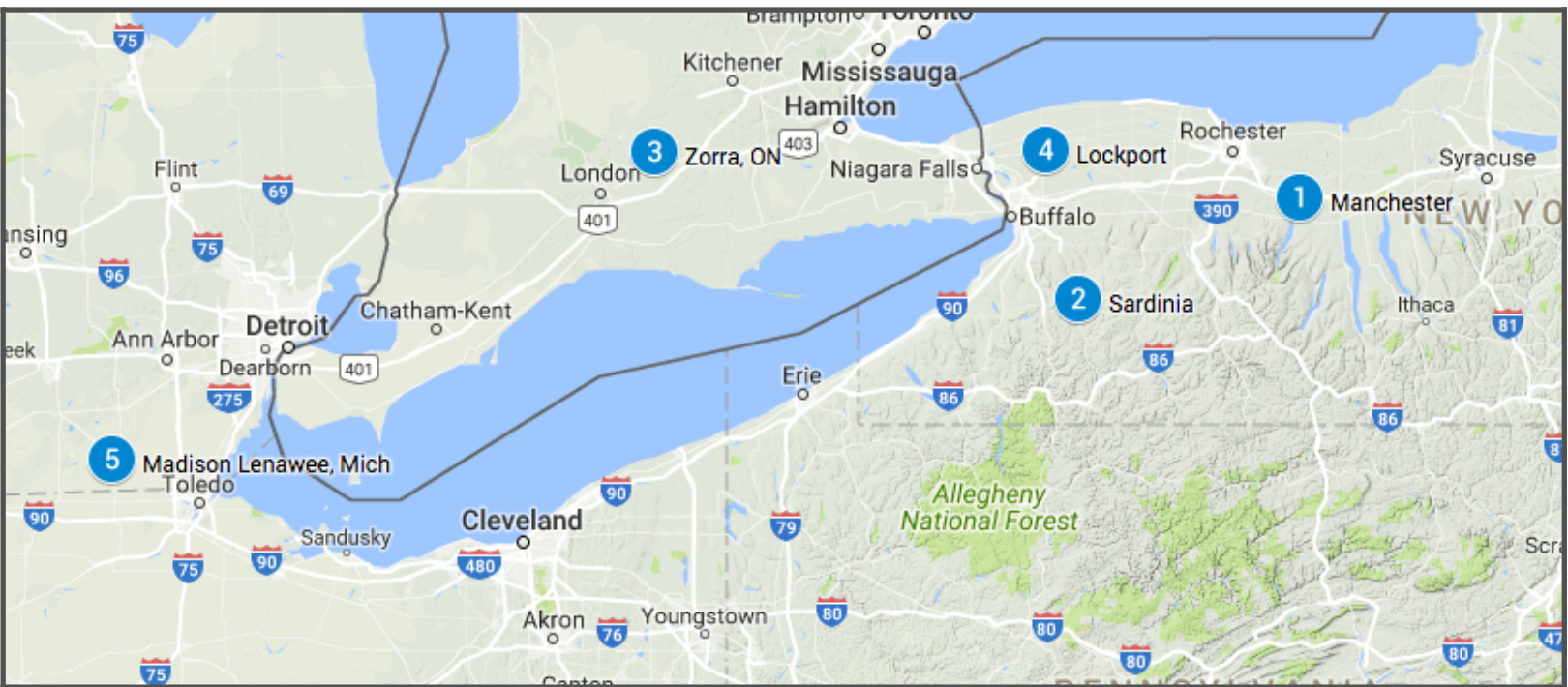
Joseph Smith and Oliver Cowdery received the Melchizedek Priesthood from Peter, James and John near the Susquehanna River between Harmony, Pennsylvania and Colesville, New York. (see D&C 128:20)

June 1829

Translation of the Book of Mormon completed. The Three Witnesses and the Eight Witnesses shown the gold plates. (see 2 Nephi 11:3; 2 Nephi 27:12–13; D&C 17)

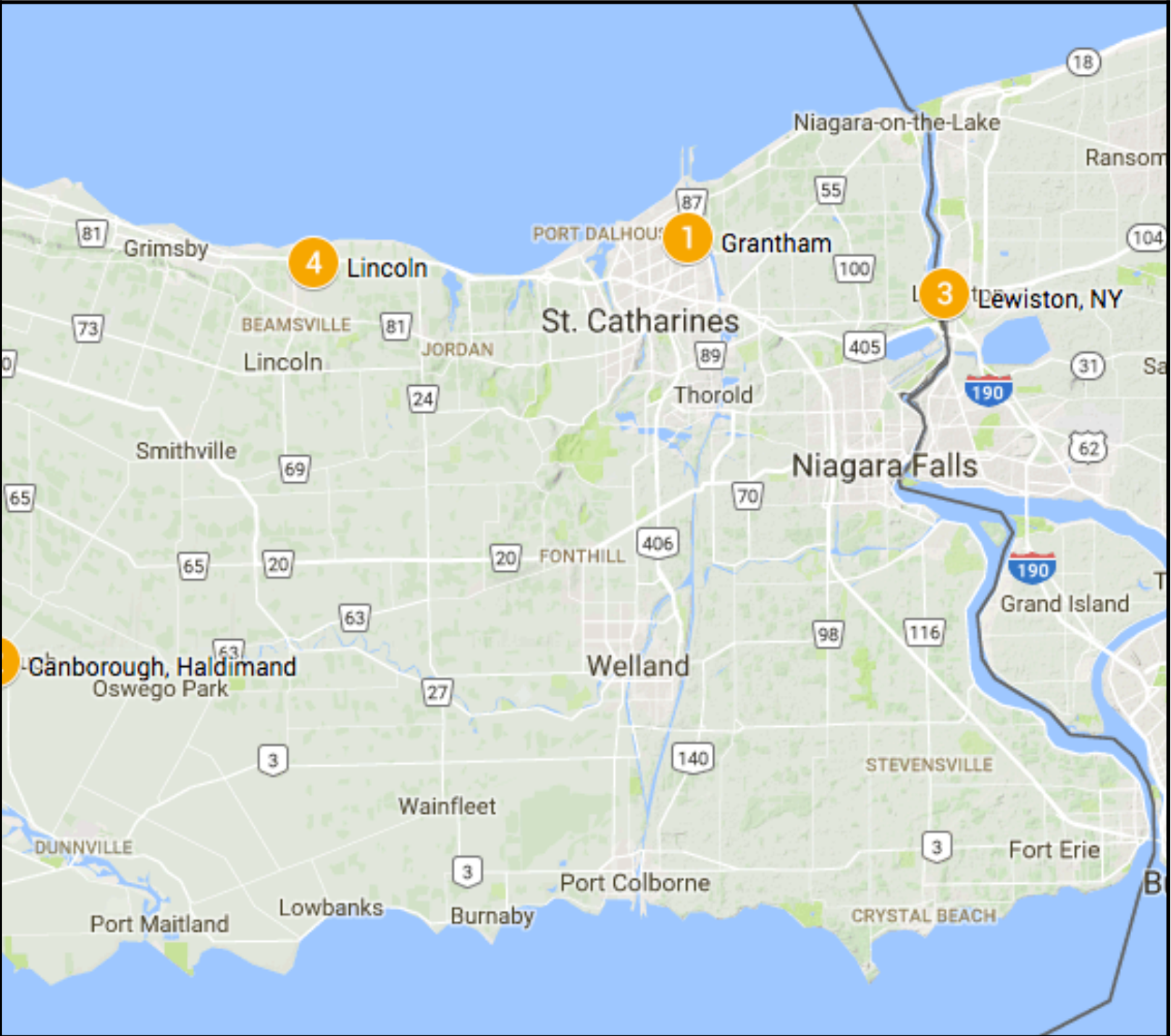
19 November 1829

Birth: Nehemiah Sly son of James Calvin Sly & Mary Bassett in Sardinia, New York. ^{3, Map A2}

<p>Fall 1829</p>	<p>After the birth of Nehemiah Sly, James & Mary Sly moved from Sardinia to Lockport, New York. ^{3, Map A4}</p>
<p>February 1830</p>	<p>Letter written by Mary Bassett Sly to her parents in Michigan. James', wife Mary and son Nehemiah Sly were living in Lockport, New York. James found work to be scarce on the New York side of Niagara so he left to go to the west side of the Falls into Upper Canada. He hired out to work for \$15 dollars a month. He worked a few days and was taken sick with a disease called the Black Canker (Infection of the mouth and gums) It was deadly and had killed several people in the area. James was given some Vinegar to drink and it seemed to help. ^{4, Map A5}</p>
<p>13 February 1830</p>	<p>Birth of James' step-daughter to be. Mary Ann born to Margaret Jane Fuller and an unknown man in Lincoln, Niagara, Ontario, Canada. ^{3, Map B4}</p>
<p>1830</p>	<p>At this time James Calvin Sly probably met Daniel Cook Jr. & Maria Fuller family in Zorra, Ontario, Canada. A family that would have a big influence on his life. They more than likely were the family that gave him the Vinegar and nursed him back to health. Later when he accepted the gospel about 1844 he baptized many of the members of the Cook and Fuller families. ^{4, Map A5}</p>
<p>26 March 1830</p>	<p>First printed copies of the Book of Mormon available in Palmyra, New York. ¹</p>
<p>28 May 1830</p>	<p>Indian Removal Act moves eastern Indians west of the Mississippi River. It was signed into law by Andrew Jackson. ¹</p>
<p>April 1830</p>	<p>James returned home to Lockport, NY, his mouth was still sore, but James hired out to tend a sawmill and drive a team in the Lockport area for \$16.5 dollars per month. ^{4, Map A4}</p>
<p>6 April 1830</p>	<p>Organization of the Church in Fayette Township, New York. ¹</p>

16 May 1830

Mary Bassett Sly and son Nehemiah were in poor health she wanted to see her parents. She states in the letter that she and Nehemiah were not healthy enough to cross the lake (Lake Erie) to be able to see them. James did not want to work all summer and use the money to take her to see them. They had bills to pay and money was scarce. Mary was realizing that a trip to see them was totally impractical so she admonished her parents (Nehemiah Bassett and Mary Lawson) living in Lenawee county, Michigan, to come to live close by her. She closed the letter with the following: "I want you should come and see our great boy. He is almost big enough to chop down small trees" She stated: "We live in the lower town a few yards from the Lockport House." Mary and Nehemiah would pass away soon after this letter was written. ^{4, Map A5}

20 July 1830	Site for the city of Zion (the New Jerusalem) in Independence, Missouri, revealed to the Prophet Joseph Smith. (see D&C 57; Articles of Faith 1:10)
25 July 1830	Death: Mary Bassett Sly 22, Lockport, Niagara, New York. Mary is James Calvin Sly's 1st wife. 3, Map A4
Sep-Oct 1830	First missionaries called to preach to the Lamanites (Native Americans) (see D&C 28; 30; 32).
30 August 1830	Death of son Nehemiah Sly 1, Lockport, Niagara, New York. 3, Map A4
Dec-Jan 1830-31	The Lord commanded the Saints to gather to Ohio. (see D&C 37; 38:31-32)
1 September 1831	Marriage of James Calvin Sly 24 to Margaret Jane Fuller 26 in Grantham, Lincoln, Ontario, Canada. Margaret had a daughter named Mary Ann 1yr old who then took the name of Sly. 3, Map B1, Chart 3
18 March 1833	Sidney Rigdon and Frederick G. Williams set apart as Counselors in the Presidency of the Church and given the keys of the kingdom. (see the headings to D&C 81 and D&C 90; & D&C 90:6)
6 April 1832	Birth of son David C Sly son of James Calvin Sly & Margaret Jane Fuller Sly in Grantham, Lincoln, Ontario, Canada. 3, Map B1
18 April 1832	Death of son David C Sly son of James Calvin Sly & Margaret Jane Fuller Sly in Grantham, Lincoln, Ontario, Canada. 3, Map B1



7 November 1833	Saints began fleeing from mobs in Jackson County, Missouri, across the Missouri River and into Clay County, Missouri. ¹
5 May 1834	Joseph Smith left Kirtland, Ohio, for Missouri as the leader of Zion's Camp to bring relief to Saints expelled from Jackson County. ¹
14 February 1835	The Quorum of the Twelve Apostles organized in Kirtland, Ohio. (see D&C 107:23–24)
17 August 1835	The Doctrine and Covenants accepted as a standard work of the Church in Kirtland, Ohio. ¹
27 March 1836	Kirtland Temple dedicated by Joseph Smith Jr. ²
3 April 1836	Jesus Christ appeared to Joseph Smith and Oliver Cowdery in the Kirtland Temple. (see D&C 110:1–10). Moses, Elias, and Elijah appeared and conveyed priesthood keys (D&C 110:11–16)
26 January 1837	Michigan admitted as a state. ¹
19 July 1837	Elder Heber C. Kimball and six others arrived in Liverpool, England, on the first overseas mission. ¹
26 April 1838	Name of the Church specified by revelation. (see D&C 115:4)
4 July 1838	Iowa Territory Organized until it later became a state. ¹

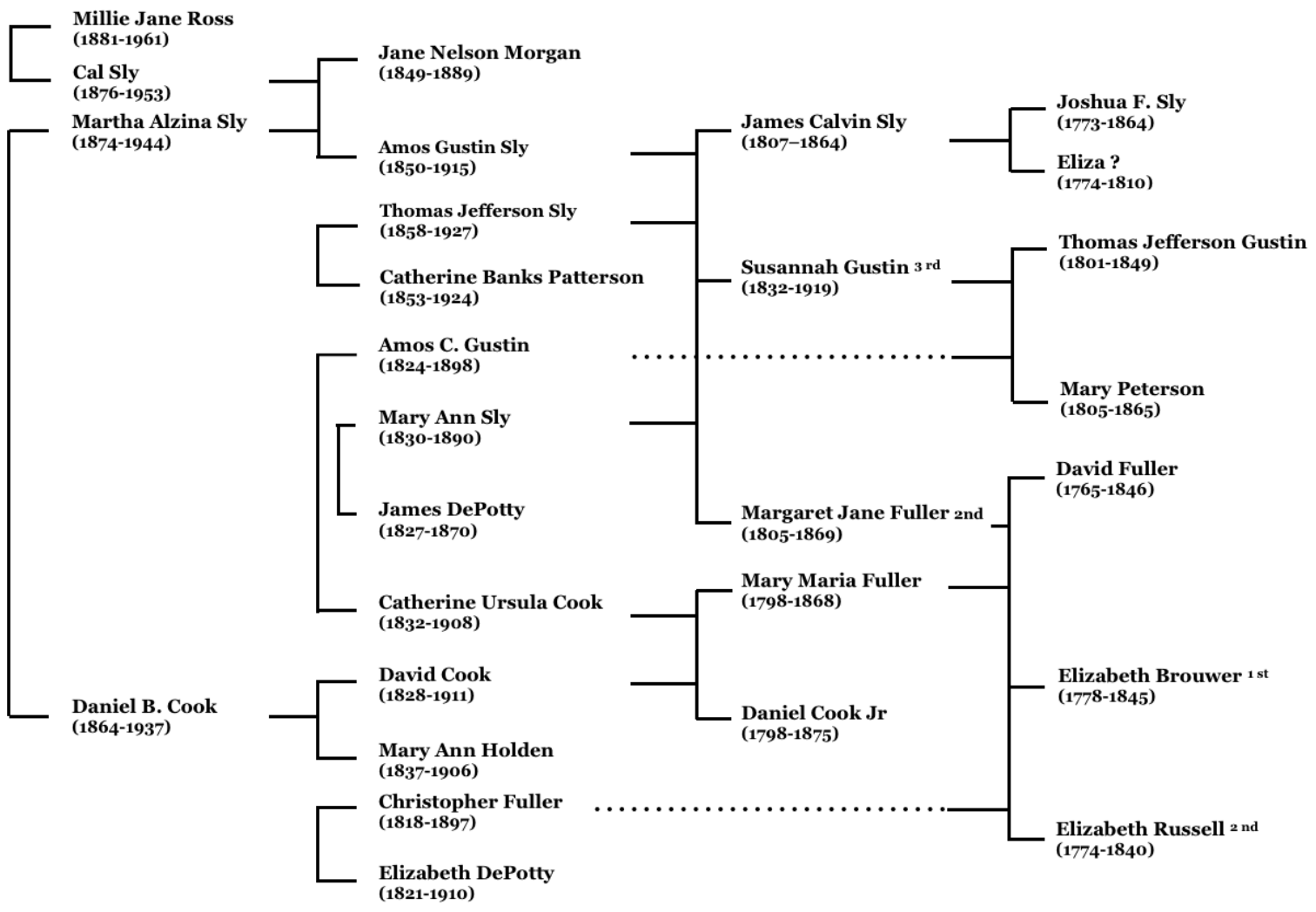
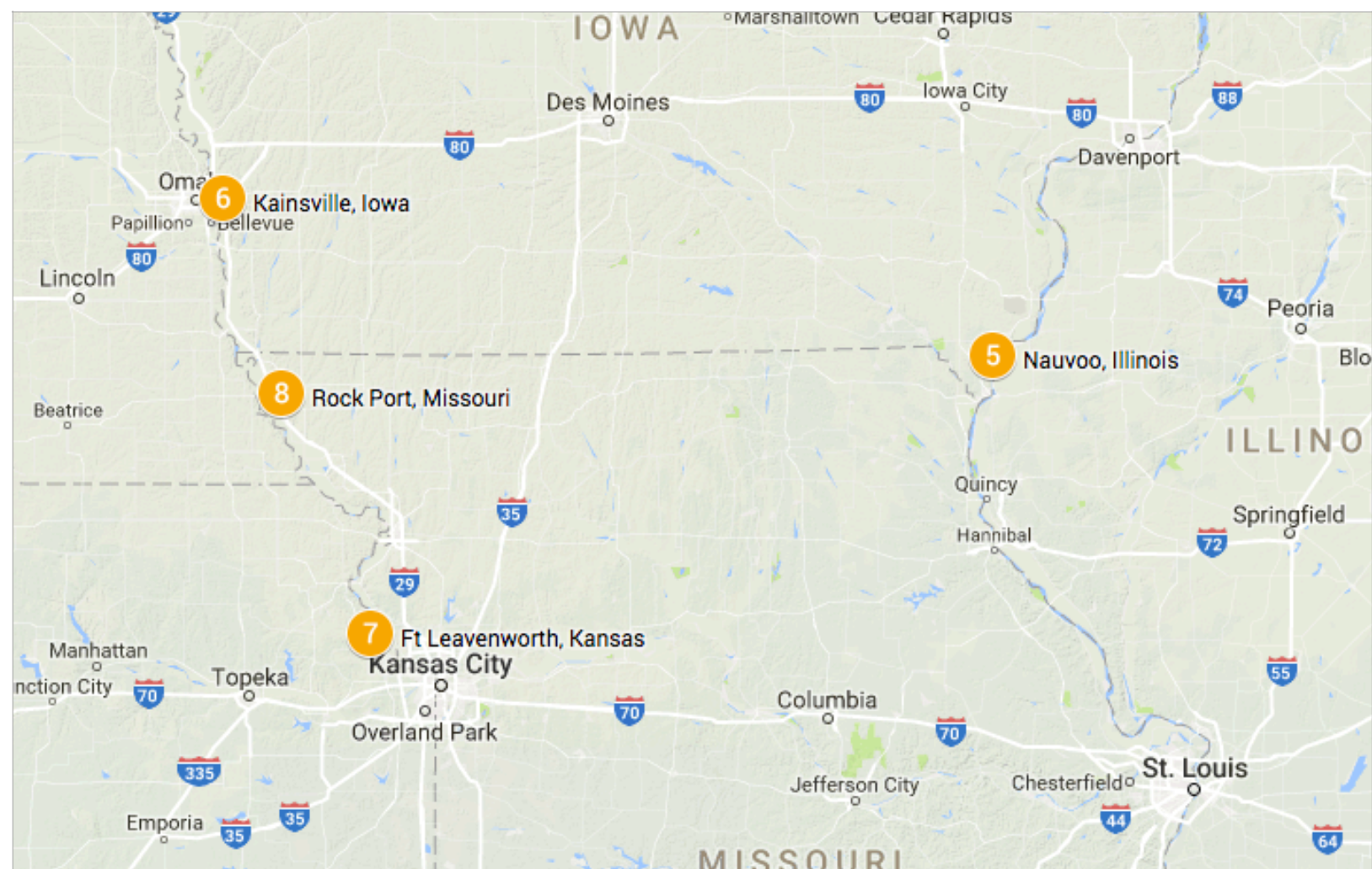

1 December 1838 16 April 1839	The Prophet Joseph Smith and others imprisoned at Liberty Jail in Liberty, Missouri. (see D&C 121–123)
1840	The Oregon Trail becomes established and the movement Westward starts. ¹
15 August 1840	Baptism for the dead publicly announced by the Prophet Joseph Smith. ¹
24 October 1841	Elder Orson Hyde dedicated Palestine for return of the children of Abraham. ¹
17 March 1842	Female Relief Society organized in Nauvoo, Illinois. ¹
4 May 1842	First full temple endowments given in Nauvoo, Illinois. ¹
1844	1832-1844: This was a time when James and Jane Sly must have had a hard time having children. James & Margaret Jane had lost their son David. ^{3, Map B1}
9 March 1844	James Calvin Sly was baptized a member of the LDS Church in Lewiston, Niagara, New York ^{3,10, Map B3} James Calvin Sly was a great missionary for the church. He was baptized into the church in Lewiston, Niagara, New York in March 1844. He went to Canboro, Haldimand, Ontario, Canada and baptized the Fuller brothers, (Daniel and Isaac). (Journal of History of the Church). When he returned as a missionary in 1855 he found these two brothers once again. How great their reunion must have been. Neva Pace Robinson Smith on the Fuller and Cook Families. ^{10, Map B2}
27 April 1844	Calling: Branch Clerk Lewiston, Niagara, New York. ^{3, Map B3}
27 June 1844	Joseph and Hyrum Smith martyred at Carthage Jail in Carthage, Illinois. (see D&C 135)
November 1844	James Calvin Sly baptized Daniel Cook Jr. & his wife Mary Maria Fuller into the Church in Canboro, Haldimand, Ontario, Canada. Margaret Jane Fuller Sly's two brothers Daniel & Isaac Fuller were also baptized by James Calvin Sly. ^{10, Map B2}
December 1844	James Calvin Sly baptized Margaret Jane Fuller Sly's brother Christopher and his wife Elizabeth Depotty Fuller into the LDS Church in Canboro, Haldimand, Ontario, Canada. They had a daughter Barbara Ellen Fuller who was about 1 year of age. Elizabeth had a child named William Bristol 4 yrs from a previous marriage. ^{10, Map B2}
about 1845	Death of Elizabeth Brouwer Fuller in Lincoln, Niagara, Ontario, Canada. She is the mother of Margaret Jane Fuller Sly. ^{3, Map B4, Chart 3}
1845	James Calvin Sly, his wife Margaret Jane Fuller Sly, and her father David Fuller left Canada and moved to Nauvoo, Illinois. ¹ This was just after the death of Joseph Smith Jr. Brigham Young was going through succession problems and Nauvoo was a tough place to be if you were a Mormon. Daniel Cook Jr family with wife Mary Maria Fuller and eleven of their 12 Children also went to Nauvoo ^{9, Map C5, Chart 3}

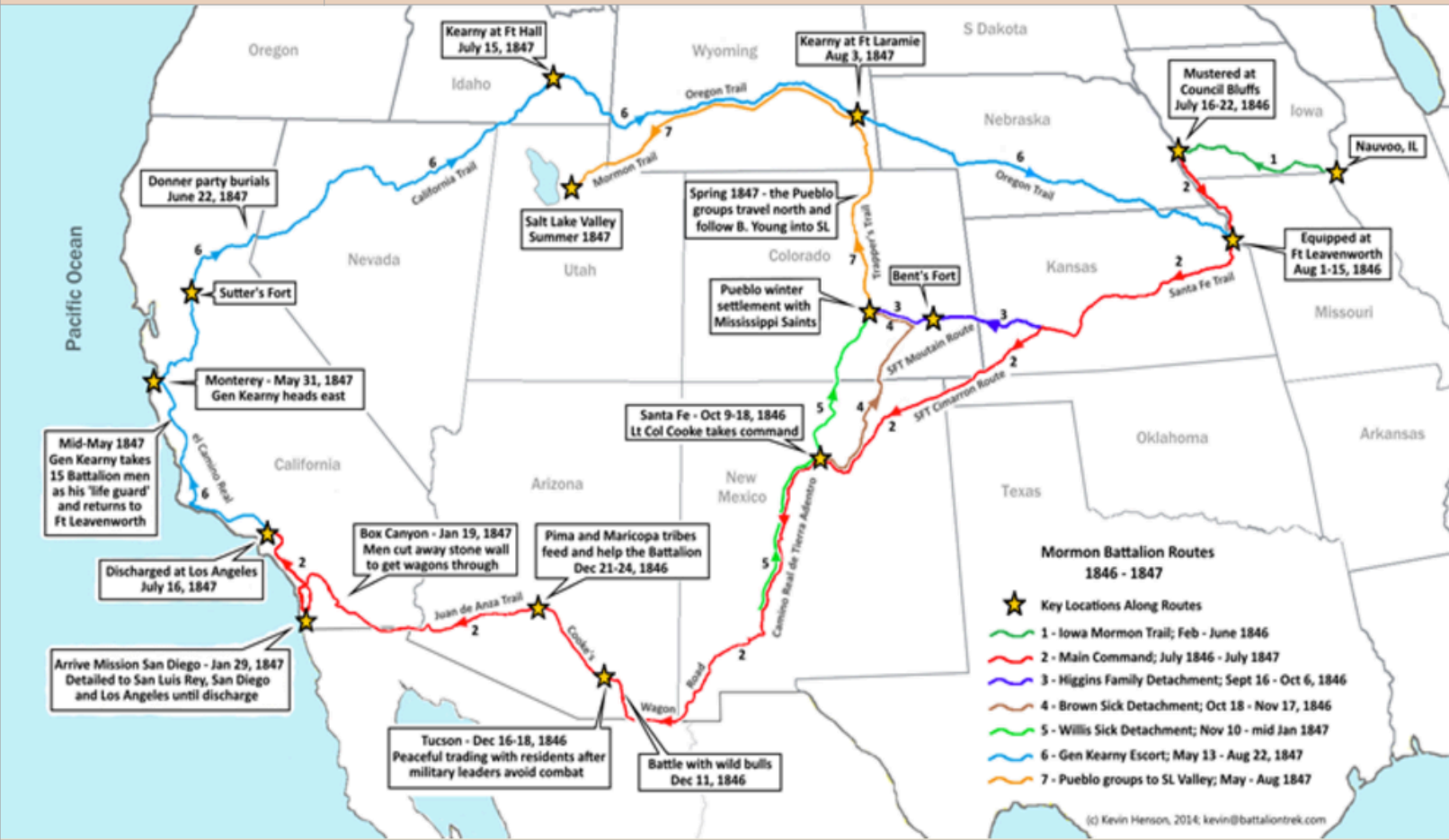
July 1845	The War with Mexico starts. James K Polk sent General Zachary Taylor to Texas and by October 3,500 Americans were ready to take by force the disputed land. ¹
4 February 1846	Nauvoo Saints began crossing the Mississippi River to move west. Some Saints sailed from New York City for California on the ship <i>Brooklyn</i> . ¹
about 1846	Marriage of Mary Ann Sly to James Depotty in Ontario, Canada. Mary is the daughter of Margaret Jane Fuller Sly. ^{Map B4} James is the brother of Elizabeth Depotty who married Christopher Fuller, a younger brother of Margaret Jane Sly. They left Canada and immigrated to Nauvoo, Illinois. ^{3, Map C5,} Depotty is spelled many different ways so I settled on Depotty, Chart 3
April 1846	Death of David Fuller in Nauvoo, Illinois, Margaret's Jane's father. ^{3, Map C5, Chart 3}
1 May 1846	Nauvoo Temple dedicated by Orson Hyde. ²
1846	The saints including (James & Jane Sly) and Jane's daughter and Son-in-Law (James Depotty and Mary Ann Sly) were driven out of Nauvoo and headed west to help establish the town of Kanesville, Iowa. James Depotty and Mary Ann had two of their children born in Kanesville, where they stayed until about 1850. ^{10, Map C6, Chart 3}
15 June 1846	The Oregon Boundary with Canada is established at the 49th parallel. ¹

16 July 1846 In Kanesville James Calvin Sly enlisted in **Mormon Battalion (MB)**. He left his wife, stepdaughter & her husband. Margaret Jane may have been very upset with his decision.^{10, Map C6, Chart 3}

21 July 1846 The **MB** left from Kanesville, Iowa. Kanesville (Counsel Bluffs) was just being formed by saints that had to flee for their lives from Nauvoo, Illinois.^{3,10, Map C6}

1 August 1846 The **MB** reached Ft. Leavenworth Kansas on the Missouri Border. They received a heavy backpack & a clothes allowance of \$42. Most sent the money to their families to help in their migration west.^{5, Map C7}

16 September 1846 The **MB** was proceeding southwest toward Mexico. When they were almost due east of **Pueblo** they met a group of saints from Mississippi headed by Captain John Brown. Some of the Battalion were very sick and along with Mississippi saints the first sick detachment left and went to Pueblo for recuperation with the intention of joining Brigham Young and the saints.^{5, Map D}



Map D: James Calvin Sly Mormon Battalion Routes 1846-1847

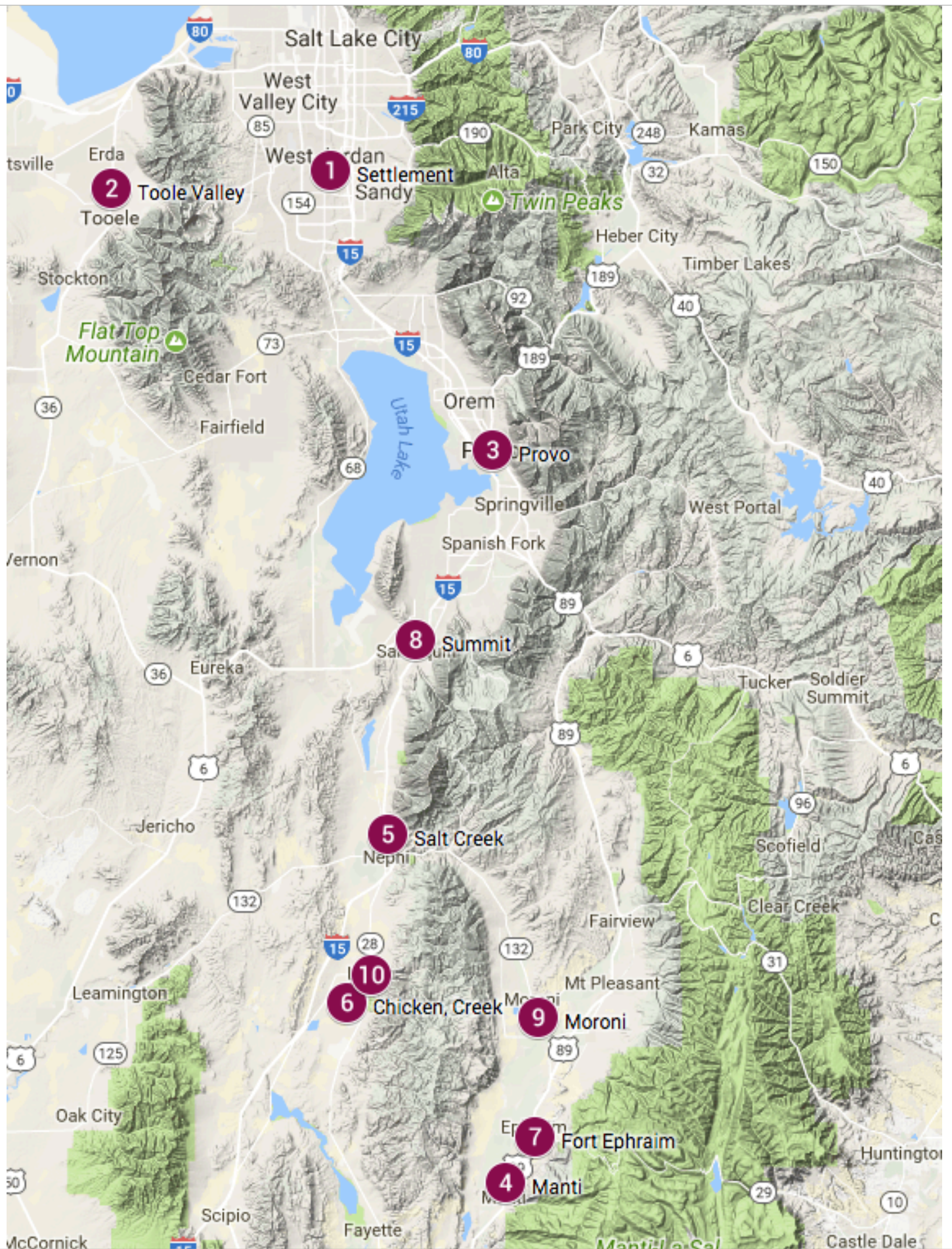
9-18 October 1846 Lt. Colonel A. J. Smith marched the **MB** to Santa Fe reaching there on the 9th and Leaving on the 18 October. The second sick detachment left to go to Pueblo. Lt Smith is replaced by Lt. Phillip St. George Cooke. Please read a more detailed story about the forced march these men had to endure.^{5, Map D}

10 November 1846 When the **MB** reached the southern part of **New Mexico** a third detachment of the sick left and went to Pueblo.^{5, Map D}

11 December 1846	The battle of the bulls near the Arizona-New Mexico border . ^{5, Map D}
16 December 1846	The MB enters the city of Tucson . ^{5, Map D}
28 December 1846	Iowa admitted as a state. ¹
27 January 1847	The MB sighted the Pacific Ocean . ^{5, Map D}
29 January 1847	The MB arrives in San Pascual a few miles north of San Diego. ^{5, Map D}
3 February 1847 6 April 1847	The MB was stationed at the San Luis Rey Mission . ^{5, Map D}
April 1847	President Brigham Young's pioneer company left Winter Quarters on the journey west. (see D&C 136)
16 July 1847	The MB stationed at Ft. Moore (Los Angeles) where they were discharged one year from the time of their enlistment. ^{5, Map D}
24 July 1847	President Brigham Young entered the Salt Lake Valley. ¹
Fall 1847	James Calvin Sly with a number of discharged MB members traveled from Ft. Moore to an area near Sutter's Fort now Sacramento California . ^{6, Map D}
6 October 1847	James Christopher Depotty was born in Kanessville, Pottawattamie, Iowa to his parents James Depotty and mother Mary Ann Sly. Mary Ann's stepfather James Calvin Sly was serving in the Mormon Battalion. Her mother Margaret Jane Fuller Sly was living in Kanessville. ^{3, Map C6, Chart 3}
Fall 1847	James Calvin Sly wanted to go the Salt Lake Valley to meet with the Saints, but as his group scouted for a route through the Sierra Nevada Mountains they found it to be impassible. They turned back to Sutter's Fort, where Mr. Sutter gave the Mormon boys work. James Calvin Sly and others built corals and a small ranch house where Sly Park is today. It was named after James Calvin Sly. ⁶
2 November 1847	Death of Caleb B. Sly son of Joshua Sly & Sarah Tillotson. Caleb is a step-brother of James Calvin Sly, died in Mexico City. He was probably a member of the United States Army in the Mexican war. A very important battle happened there in the fall of 1847. ³
24 January 1848	Gold was discovered by James W Marshall in Sutter Creek, Coloma, California. ¹
24 January 1848	Gold was discovered at Coloma on the American River . James Calvin was working on a mill at Natoma near Coloma at the time. Even though gold was found the MB members were anxious to go to Salt Lake Valley. ⁶
2 February 1848	US wins the Mexican-American War, Treaty of Guadalupe is signed and Utah is ceded to the United States. ¹

1 May 1848	A company of 8 members was organized to build a road over the Sierra Nevada Mountains eastward. They built it south of Placerville and then over the mountains. This Company consisted of David Browett, Captain; Ira J. Willis; James C. Sly; Israel Evens; Jacob G. Truman; Ezra Allen; J. R. Allred; Henderson Cox and Robert Pixton. ⁶
May June 1848	Crickets in the Salt Lake Valley devastated the crops. The fields were saved from complete destruction as flocks of seagulls consumed the crickets. ¹
27 June 1848	Three of these men David Browett, Ezra Allen, and Henderson Cox were sent on a Scouting trip to find the best route. They did not return. ⁶
2 July 1848	The Jonathan H Holmes/Samuel Thomsen Company (1848) of 44 men and 1 woman including James Calvin Sly made their move to go over the Sierras. 39 of the men were from the Mormon Battalion. ^{1, 6}
19 July 1848	One of the Wagons broke down and while they were stopped they found a grave covered by rocks as they uncovered the grave they found the three men. They had been ambushed by Indians all three had been buried in the same grave. This place is called Tragedy Springs. ⁶
6 September 1848	The company broke in to small groups of 10 when they reached the Carson Valley and James Calvin Sly was a captain of his group. They entered Utah and went to the Weber Area. From there they entered the Salt Lake Valley in September more than three years after leaving Kanessville and his wife Margaret Jane Fuller Sly. ^{6, Chart 3}
Fall & Winter 1848-1849	James Calvin Sly found a home in South Salt Lake Valley (probably close to where Gardner Village is today) and settled near the home of Thomas & Mary Peterson Gustin. The Gustin family from Indiana plays a large role in the life of James Calvin Sly. ^{3, Map E1, Chart 3}
1849	The Provisional State of Deseret founded, and part of present day California, Oregon, Idaho, Wyoming, Nevada, Wyoming & Colorado were included. ¹
25 March 1849	Marriage of James Calvin Sly 42 to 3rd wife Susannah Gustin 17 in Salt Lake City, Utah Territory. James enters into polygamy, because he was still married to Margaret Jane Fuller who was living in Kanessville, Iowa. They are the parents of seven children including Amos Gustin Sly . ^{3, Chart 3}
25 June 1849	James Calvin Sly, Thomas Gustin and Wilmer Brunson left Salt Lake to go to the Gold Fields. See the Pollock Pines Epic transcribed by Jeff M Sly from the journal of James Calvin Sly. ⁶
25 July 1849	James was at Sly Park east of Sacramento, California. ⁶
29 July 1849	At Daylys Ranch in Sacramento, California a distance of about 810 miles. ⁶
17 September 1849	Death of Thomas Gustin 48 in the Gold Fields of Sierra, California. ⁶

<p>8 October 1849</p>	<p>Joseph Calvin DePartee was born in Kaneshville, Pottawattamie, Iowa to his parents James Depotty and Mary Ann Sly. Mary Ann's stepfather James Calvin Sly was hunting Gold in California with his father-in-law Thomas Gustin. Her mother Margaret Jane Fuller Sly was living in Kaneshville. ^{3, Map C6, Chart 3}</p>
<p>19 November 1849</p>	<p>The first 225 settlers lead by Isaac Morley settled in Sanpete County in the area where Manti is today. ³</p>
<p>23 November 1849</p>	<p>Goldfields: the water in the streams were high and all the mines were idle. ⁶</p>
<p>9 December 1849</p>	<p>Sunday School organized by Richard Ballantyne. ¹</p>
<p>19 January 1850</p>	<p>Birth of Amos Gustin Sly the son of James Calvin Sly & Susannah Gustin in Salt lake Valley, Utah Territory. ^{3, Map E1, Chart 3}</p>
<p>15 February 1850</p>	<p>Goldfields: "We had our gold stole from us which reduced us to poverty." ⁶</p>
<p>17 February 1850</p>	<p>Goldfields: both James and Willmer were taken sick with scurvy and Wilmer Brunson died on the 17 February. ⁶</p>
<p>Spring 1850</p>	<p>About 4 years after James Sly left with the Mormon Battalion, Margaret Jane Sly 45, her daughter Mary Ann 20 & James Depotty 31 along with their two sons left Kaneshville and went to Rockport, Atchinson, Missouri where they could prepare to go West with the Saints. They were still there in the US Census 1860. Daniel Cook Jr., wife Mary Maria Fuller Cook and family and Margaret Jane's brother's Daniel Fuller and Isaac Fuller were also with them. ^{8,9, Chart 3}</p>
<p>15 June 1850</p>	<p><i>Deseret News</i> began publication in Salt Lake City. ¹</p>
<p>20 June 1850</p>	<p>Justus Morse Company 1850 left Rockport, Missouri and arrived in the Salt Lake Valley after much dissension according the Journal of Luke Gallup 28 husband of Lydia Cook 27. Members: Daniel Cook Jr. 51, wife Mary Maria Fuller Cook 52, Daniel III 23, David 22, Catherine Ursula 18, James Nathaniel 17, Thomas 16, Caroline 13, Hannah Elizabeth 11, Isaac 9. An Older daughter Eliza Ann Cook had married & remained in Upper Canada. Two other children Stephen and Mary Jane Cook had passed away before the Company left probably in Kaneshville, Iowa. This is the family that James Calvin Sly had baptized into the Church in Upper Canada. Daniel Fuller & Isaac Fuller brothers of Mary Fuller Cook were also in Missouri and were preparing to go back to Canada to convince their brother Christopher Fuller and his family to immigrate to Utah. ^{1,3,10, Chart 3}</p>
<p>2 October 1850</p>	<p>Arrival of the Jusus Morse Company in Salt Lake City, Utah Territory. ¹</p>
<p>1850</p>	<p>US Census 1850 for Daniel Cook (52), wife Mary Maria Fuller (53), Daniel (25), David (23), Catherine (19), James 17, Thomas 16, Caroline 14, Hannah 12 and Isaac 10. It shows them living in the Salt Lake Valley. They were James Calvin Sly's in-laws whom he had introduced to the LDS Church and probably were the family that had helped nurse him back to health when he was in Upper Canada working in 1830. ^{2, Map E1, Chart 3}</p>

<p>17 August 1850</p>	<p>James Calvin Sly 43 traveled from Sacramento (17 August 1850) to Salt Lake City (29 September 1850) in the Amasa M Lyman Company 1850 with 33 other individuals. This Company going east from Carson Valley over the desert passed hundreds of Gold Rush emigrants who were destitute, starving, and many of their animals had been driven off by Indians. ^{1, 3, 6}</p>
<p>9 September 1850</p>	<p>The Utah Territory was organized by an Organic Act of Congress. It included most of the state of Nevada, all of Utah, some of Wyoming and the western part of Colorado. Brigham Young had envisioned a much larger Deseret State until the US Congress acted on this date. ³</p>
<p>9 September 1850</p>	<p>New Mexico Territory is formed. ¹</p>
<p>9 September 1850</p>	<p>Utah Territory is formed. ¹</p>
<p>9 September 1850</p>	<p>California admitted as a state. ¹</p>
<p>29 September 1850</p>	<p>Arrival of the Amasa M Lyman Company 1850 in the Salt Lake Valley. ^{1, 3, 6}</p>
<p>Fall 1850</p>	<p>After the exodus of Daniel Cook & Mary Maria's family to SLC they then moved to the Tooele Valley. Her brothers went back to Canada. Margaret Jane Fuller Sly and her daughter Mary Ann Sly Depotty's family stayed in Rockport, Missouri until they came west in about 1862. ^{10, Map E2, Chart 3}</p>
<p>1851</p>	<p>Salt Creek (Nephi): The site along Salt Creek was a camping area on the Mormon Road to Southern California. Mormon settlers established a settlement, which was on Salt Creek. The settlement retained the name Salt Creek until 1882 when the name was changed to Nephi. ³</p>
<p>April 1851</p>	<p>Daniel Cook and Mary Maria Fuller family moved to Provo from the Tooele Valley. ^{3, Map E3, Chart 3}</p>
<p>29 April 1851</p>	<p>US Census 1850: (it was late, it commenced in April 1851) for Manti, Sanpete, Utah Territory. It shows James Calvin Sly 44, wife Susannah Gustin 19 and son Amos Gustin Sly 1 yr. ^{3,2, Map E4, Chart 3}</p>

The war was sparked on July 17, 1853 by a confrontation with James Walker Ivie in Springville in Utah Valley. It resulted in the death of a band member, Shower-O-Cats, a relative of Walkara. The Indians wanted to trade goods near Ivie's home, when Ivie tried to intervene in an argument over a trade between a Ute and his wife. Ivie wounded several of the Indians and one died. When Ivie would not comply with Indian requests for compensation, believing that he acted in self-defense, tension between Mormon settlers and the Utes reached its peak. ²

21 April 1866	The Circleville Massacre. ³
28 November 1866	Birth of Mary Jane Ollerton daughter of Seth Ollerton & Susannah Gustin Sly in Chicken Creek, Juab, Utah Territory. ^{3, Map E6}
30 March 1867	Alaska is Purchased from Russia & Nebraska was admitted as a state. ¹
28 May 1867	Death of Daniel Samuel Sly (4) son of James Calvin Sly & Susannah Gustin in Chicken Creek, Utah Territory. ^{3, Map E6}

It also took them a full day to swim their herd of oxen across the Green River, which was swollen from the spring runoff. They reached the end-of-track terminus of Benton in July and waited about six weeks for the emigrants, most of whom had crossed the Atlantic on the steamship Colorado. It took the emigrants about a week to travel from New York to the outfitting place on the train. The emigrants arrived in Benton, where they met their teamsters on August 7 and left a week later. The company included 411 passengers and 61 wagons. Twenty-five of the wagons were loaded with goods destined for stores in Salt Lake, including the new Zion's Cooperative Mercantile Institution. They traveled in a northwesterly direction from Benton through Whiskey Gap and northward from there until they reached the Sweetwater River and joined the old emigrant road. They arrived in Salt Lake on September 2. Seven people, mostly young children, died en route. ¹ . The transcontinental railroad was still under construction & the tracts terminated in Wyoming. 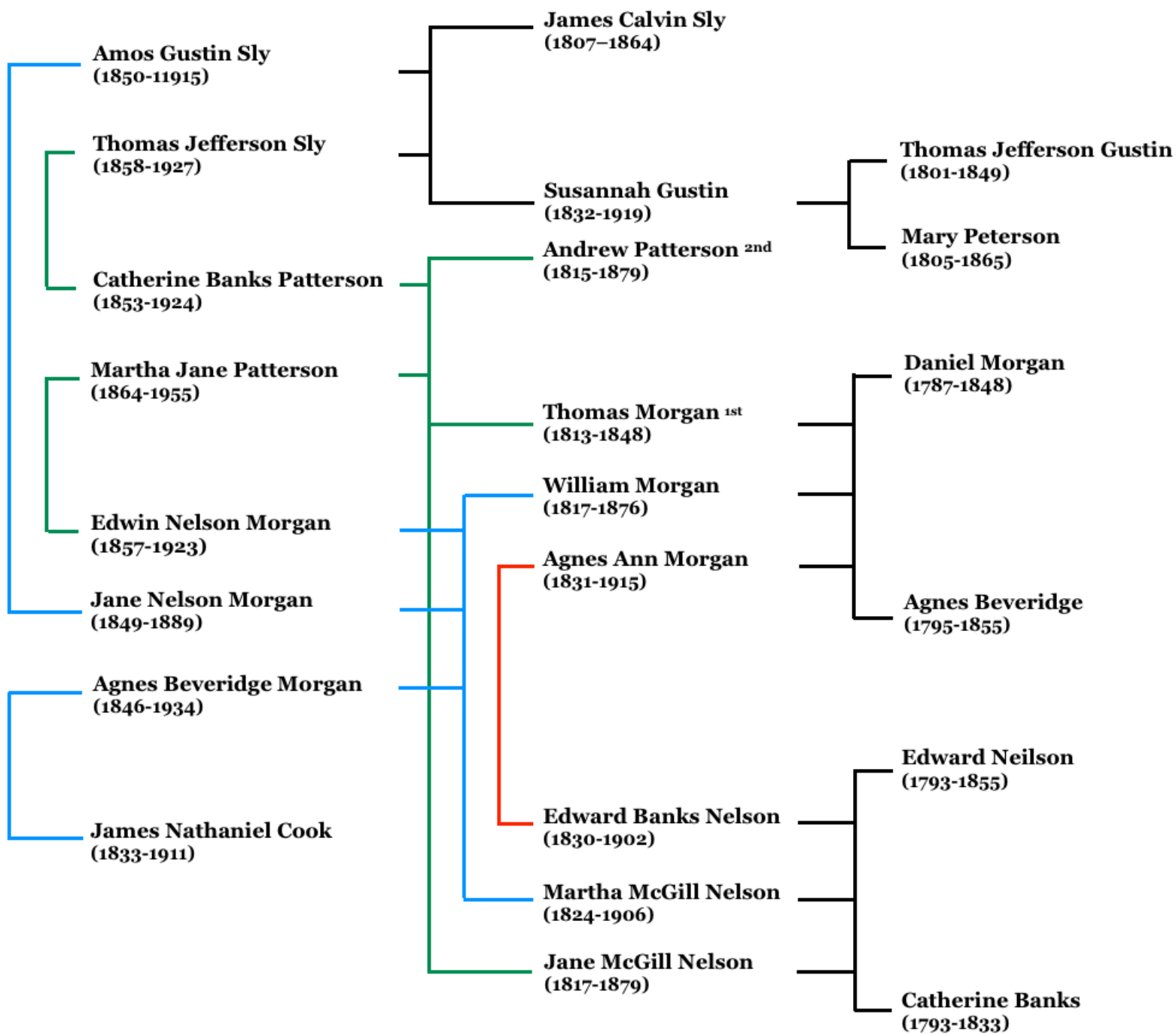
